SAFETY FIRST

Congratulations to our local curbside collection staff who achieved a safety milestone in 2015.

In 2014, our contractor Progressive Waste Solutions committed to becoming a leader in safety. The safety commitment started with the senior managers throughout their entire operating area in Canada and the USA signing a pledge to make safety the company's main focus.



In any given year there are a number of grim statistics within the garbage collection industry including accidents, injuries and fatalities.

The job of garbage or recycling collector consistently ranks amongst **the top 10 of North America's most dangerous professions.**

Focus points to improve the safety of staff and other road users included eliminating distracted driving (by only using radios and phones when stopped), installing cameras and recorders to monitor speed and sudden braking events, as well as being extra vigilant of pedestrians or other workers when reversing and tipping loads at facilities.

In January 2016, the local staff were very proud to learn Vancouver Island District led the entire company for 2015 in having the least collisions and achieving a dramatically reduced injury rate for both long term and short term injuries.

We are pleased to have such safety-committed players on our team.

KEEPING SCORE

Last November we received our first report card from the organisation responsible for curbside recycling in the Province. Since May 2014, when the regulations for recycling changed, recycling collected at the curb has been subject to occasional audits – a check to see how we are all doing with the new rules.

Remember - hazardous items, Styrofoam, **plastic bags and plastic wrap are not accepted** in curbside recycling.

Between May 2014 and May 2015, 14 different loads of our recycling were checked. Overall the numbers show we are about a B- grade so there is room for improvement.

- ★ Batteries, flammable liquids, solvents, and empty propane cylinders can all be recycled at depots and should be kept out of the curbside recycling.
- ★ Plastic bags, plastic wrap, and Styrofoam packaging can be taken to depots to ensure they get properly recycled.
- ★ Recycling is best kept loose in your blue box and yellow bag. This ensures everything can be separated at the sorting facility.



ASBESTOS DISPOSAL

If you are planning home renovations this year you should check if there is an asbestos hazard before you start. Things like insulation, pipe wrap and boiler insulation, textured ceilings, wallboard and siding, flooring adhesives, drywall mud/joint filler and other items manufactured prior to 1990 can all contain asbestos.

Due to health hazards associated with asbestos fibres, there are hazardous waste regulations regarding the transport and disposal of asbestos containing materials. Homeowners can take

their own waste asbestos to the Regional Landfill provided the waste is properly bagged and sealed and weighs less than 1,000 kg. It must be double bagged in 6 mil poly bags, which can be purchased at the Landfill, Church Road Transfer Station and local safety supply stores.

Note that the Church Road Transfer Station does not accept waste asbestos.

Asbestos is considered a hazardous waste and is accepted at the Regional Landfill on an appointment basis only.

Did you know?

Around 12,000 rural properties in our region have on-site septic systems treating residential wastewater. Septic systems are not designed to last forever but you can help prolong their life by being SepticSmart.

- * Don't flush unused medications down the drain. These can be returned to almost any pharmacy in our region
- * Pump your tank out regularly (every 3 to 5 years is recommended)
- * Household hazardous waste materials (such as pesticides, flammable liquids and solvents) can be recycled through ReGeneration depots
- * Conserve water so you don't overload your system

Be Aware!

If your home is located in an area frequented by bears and other wildlife, remember to:

- Store your green bin and garbage container in a secure location and keep the lids latched.
- Take containers to the curb on the morning of your collection day. Don't leave them out overnight.
- Deodorize the lid and exterior of your green bin with Lysol or bleach solution to prevent food odours from attracting wildlife.
