We have been very successful in planning and guiding our region to achieve some of the highest waste diversion and lowest per person disposal rates in the world.

WARM WEATHER GREEN BIN TIPS HOW TO PREVENT ODOURS AND PESTS

Warm weather is on the way and with it a bounty of local fresh fruit, vegetables, and seafood. Remember all food waste or food soiled paper can easily be recycled in your green bin. When the weather heats up, food waste decomposes faster, so here are some tips to prevent odours and pests:

Wrap it up!

Wrapping wet food waste in a paper towel, newspaper, empty milk cartons or cereal boxes reduces moisture and odours, and prevents nuisances.

Be Bear & Wildlife Savvy



If you reside in a rural area or one frequented by bears and other pests, please remember to:

- Store your green bin and garbage container in a secure location and keep the lids latched.
- Take containers to the curb on the morning of your collection day. Don't leave them out overnight.
- Deodorize the lid and exterior of your green bin with Lysol or bleach solution to prevent food odours from attracting wildlife.

Freeze it!

Freezing your food waste reduces odours and pests. Keep a small compostable liner bag, paper bag or empty milk carton in your freezer to store cooking grease, bones, and leftover meat and fish scraps. Remember to add them to your green

It is recommended that residents download the RDN Curbside App. It will give you access to your collection schedules, reminders for your collection day and the What Goes Where? feature. This feature acts as a digital library, giving you the ability to search household materials and determine the appropriate means of disposal. During the last snow event residents of specific areas with the Curbside App, received notice of the extra collection days.

THE FOLLOWING ITEMS ARE ACCEPTED FOR CURBSIDE COLLECTION

- Tetra Pak (Aseptic) boxes and cartons e.g. soups, sauces
- Paper-based microwave bowls and cups
- Aerosol cans (empty) and caps e.g. air fresheners, shaving cream, deodorant, hairspray, whip cream
- Spiral wound paper cans and lids
- Plastic clamshells
- Plastic cold drink cups and lids
- Plastic garden pots and seedling trays

- Paper hot and cold beverage cups
- Frozen dessert boxes e.g. ice
- Milk and cream cartons
- Paper bags with single and multiple paper layers (may include plastic layer) E.g. pet food bags
- Shredded Paper (must be in a tied clear plastic bag)







MEDICATIONS RETURN

Nanaimo region's residents return more than 4,900 kg of old medications annually

Do you know how to safely dispose of your expired or un-used medications? It's easy. Take them back to your pharmacist on your next visit. In recent years, residents in the Regional District have returned more than 4,900 kg of medications annually.

That's the same weight as more than 1,200 sockeye salmon!

The BC Medications Return Program helps divert medications from being thrown in the trash or flushed down the toilet, where they have the potential to harm the environment, children and pets.

It's not just prescription medications. The program covers

all prescription drugs; over-the-counter medications, including topical antibiotic and antifungal creams; and natural health products such as vitamins, minerals, traditional Chinese medicines, herbal products, probiotics and homeopathic medicines.

Any liquid or cream medications should be kept in their original container with any personal information removed or blacked out, and solid medications such as pills should be combined into a small bag. For more information, visit www.healthsteward.ca.

DISPOSE OF EXPIRED MARINE FLARES SAFELY

Ze's How

Transport Canada requires marine distress flares as safety equipment on recreational boats based on the type and length of the vessel. Flares are valid for four years from the date of manufacture. Expired flares contain hazardous materials and should be disposed of properly, not in household garbage. The following locations accept expired flares:

COMMERCIAL TRAFFIC AT THE LANDFILL AND TRANSFER STATION

As of February 15, 2017 Commercial customers of the Landfill and Transfer Station will be required to have a hard hat, Hi-Visibility Clothing and Safety Footwear when using the Commercial Disposal Areas.
