REVIEW OF FALL 2013 APPLICATIONS

The Grants Committee reviewed applications for Youth and Community Recreation Grants. Priority was given to new applicants and/or projects that benefited large numbers of people or people living in remote areas.

Five applications were received for Youth Grants, requesting \$11,140. All five Youth Grant applications met grant criteria and are recommended for funding for a total of \$9,504.

Ten applications were received for Community Grants, requesting \$18,558. One application from Oceanside Building Learning Together for deer fencing at Storybook Village was not recommended for funding. The remaining nine Community Grant applications met the grant criteria and are recommended for funding for a total of \$9,110.

Dear Mr. Thorkelsson,

On behalf of the Canadian Red Cross, I am pleased to advise you that an employee of the Regional District of Nanaimo, Anne Porteous, has continued her involvement in a very exciting Red Cross water safety project. She currently is employed by the RDN as an Aquatic Programmer at the Ravensong Aquatic Centre.

China has one of the highest drowning rates in the world, and the Chinese Red Cross Society has been taking action to reduce these numbers. The Canadian Red Cross and the Chinese Red Cross are building on an established relationship to exchange technical knowledge on disaster management and safety. The Water Safety Training program was first piloted in Xiamen, Fujian Province in 2011 and received the Canadian Red Cross Excellence in Programs award in June 2012.

On September 20, Anne returned from her third trip to China on behalf of the Canadian Red Cross. As part of a delegation of Red Cross staff and volunteers, she travelled to Zhoushan, Zhejiang Province where water safety knowledge, skills and techniques were exchanged with the Chinese Red Cross Society, local Lifesaving Society and government officials.

As a Swimming and Water Safety Master Instructor Trainer, Anne was selected from Western Canada to be part of this elite team. We are incredibly grateful to Anne and her colleagues for their passion and enthusiasm for this project. Anne's involvement has been entirely on her own personal time, and involves not only the two week period of travel to China for each training session, but countless hours of preparation and follow-up.

I was fortunate to accompany the delegation to Zhoushan, and would like to convey what an exceptional job Anne did in making our team successful. She was very adaptive to travelling to a new province in China, and always enthusiastic in her presentation of the training materials and interaction with our Chinese counterparts.

We are very proud of our efforts, which in Zhoushan included the training of 25 teachers on Canadian Swimming and Water Safety methods, the provision of



another 50 teachers with water safety classroom education techniques, and the sharing of public education ideas and resources that are aimed at fishing villages.

We would be pleased to support your public information representatives in the development and distribution of messages to the media and public highlighting Anne's involvement in this program.

We appreciate the support you have given Anne to date, and hope you can continue to assist her involvment in this exciting venture. Our congratulations for having such skilled staff among your team.

PROGRAMS/EVENTS/ICE RENTALS:


Programs:


- Program registrations are up by 38 registrations from 146 to 184 and subsequently an increase
 in revenue of \$2,045 from \$8,732 to \$10,777 from 2012. The largest increase is in the Pond
 Rascals-Learn to Skate lessons with 64 registered for the first session this year, up from 33 for
 the corresponding session in 2012.
- The Fall skating schedule commenced on Sept. 23rd with Everyone Welcome and Family Skate sessions. Attendance has been varied during the week but busy on the weekend with 60 skaters attending the Sept. 29th Everyone Welcome Skate.
- The Lions sponsored "Free Family Skate" returned on Sept. 29th with 136 in attendance.
- Seniors Drop in Hockey attendance is slightly down from 2012.
- Two birthday parties were held during the first weekend of public skating. This year a "hot dog
 option" was added to the package but early indications from these bookings show a tendency to
 choose "Healthy Options" (fruit and veggie trays) instead. A "Create Your Own Party" was held
 on the same weekend.
- Two (2) "Glow in the Dark" parties are booked for October and a waiting on a third for confirmation.
- Skate Sharpening is slightly higher than last year with 200 pairs sharpened in Sept. compared to 174 pairs in 2012.

Facility Rentals:

- The Panters "Fall Classic" returned Sept. 10-12 with 22 teams attending. Teams were divided into 4 age divisions, 60, 65, 70+ 75 years. Teams participating were from Massachusetts, Colorado, Manitoba, Alberta, the lower mainland and Vancouver Island. A social during the Classic was held on the Oceanside Pond dry floor.
- Oceanside Generals started their season in the Vancouver Island Junior Hockey League (VIJHL) and hosted their home opener on Sept. 7th, with approximately 700 spectators in attendance.
 The club released their Head Coach on Sept. 28th after a slow start to the season and are

- currently under the direction of their assistant coach. The VIJHL signed on with "Fast Hockey" for internet web broadcasts of all VIJHL games and the Beach 88.5 is also broadcasting Generals games on the radio.
- Skate Canada conducted their annual Regional Development Camp at Oceanside Place on Sept. 21 and 22nd.
- Adult Recreational Hockey Leagues are showing a decline in registrations in both male and female divisions resulting in fewer teams than 2012.





FACILITY OPERATIONS:

- The Oceanside Place Lighting Upgrade received confirmation of incentives available from BC Hydro and final RDN project approval on Sept. 24th. The agreement with BC Hydro has been executed and the agreement with the Contractor has been reviewed and is currently receiving signatures. The projected timeline for completion is December 31, 2013.
- Oceanside Minor Hockey Association and OP staff are currently working on a resolution to accommodate the increased number of female players on coed teams and also the increased number of game officials/referees required for games. There are certain periods of ice time, typically on weekends, where dressing rooms are full and cannot handle requests for separate rooms for either males and females or officials with amenities such as toilet, sink and showers.

This event was very well attended by the seniors; however, it was disappointing when only 6 of the 13 youth who registered attended. In response to this, next year the event will begin at 4:30pm and go until 6:30pm instead of 4-6pm, giving students more time to participate in afterschool extracurricular activities and sports as well as attend the event. We may also push the event back another week just to give more time for advertising in the schools.

Youth Career Night: Sept 25, 11 youth registered and 10 showed up to this free program. Feedback from the facilitators (Diana Jolly and Colleen Dykslag from the Career Centre) was that the youth participated a lot and seemed to get a lot from the event. Attached is the handout provided to the youth at the workshop. The employers participating changes seasonally and differs from the March session (i.e. March workshop included Paradise Mini Golf and Tiger Lily Farm).
